

Tracks

Fri 2 May - Thu 8 May

In 1977, Australian naturalist Robyn Davidson decided to cross 1,700 miles of the Outback on foot, alone, with only the water her three camels could carry. Her motivation to make a journey that most thought impossible, or at the very least dangerously reckless, is as enigmatic as the woman herself. The result is a film which tackles some of the big and beautiful questions about survival and the human drive to keep going, when all hope seems to be lost.

At only 27 years old, Davidson (Mia Wasikowska) spent two years in Alice Springs leaning how to train and care for the camels who would be her life-line. While she may have been mentally and physically ready for her journey, Davidson still lacked the necessary funding to turn her dream into a reality. Putting her desire to be self-sufficient to one side, Davidson enters into an arrangement with National Geographic, which includes the caveat that allows photographer Rick Smolan (Adam Driver) to join her at selected stages along the route, documenting her progress and the incredible journey.

Adapted from Davidson's own travelogue by Marion Nelson, *Tracks* is an inspiring piece of filmmaking. Like the Robert Redford vehicle *All Is Lost* or even Alphonso Curon's *Gravity*, *Tracks* charts two journeys – the physical quest for survival and the more difficult search for inner peace.

After the Night Ate Ver A Luz

Gang culture, criminality, double-crossing and revenge are a part of everyday life in Reboleria and escape seems practically impossible. First time filmmaker Basil da Cunha offers a rare glimpse into life on the streets in a tough ghetto community outside Lisbon. Just as *City of God* brought the realities of living in Brazilian favelas, *After the Night* does the same for this Cap Verdean community.

Shot in a documentary style, using hand-held cameras on location with non-professional actors, the film focuses its gaze on Sombra (the incredibly expressive Pedro Ferreira). A young Cap Verdean recently released from prison, Sombra is carrying a debt to the notorious Olos (Joao Veiga). Over a 24 hour period he must find the money if he wants to stay alive. Wandering around the neighbourhood, threatening and being threatened, the legacy of his criminal life weighs heavily on his shoulders.

Ferreira's performance means that sympathy for Sombra is inevitable, and his intelligence and humanity shine through despite his questionable actions and inevitable fate. Da Cunha observes this main character and the world around him without judgment; painting a portrait of a very real world beyond the margins of contemporary Portugal.

Wrinkles Arrugas

Based on Paco Roca's Award-winning graphic novel, Wrinkles is yet another wonderful example of how animation is not just for children. A touching story from Spain about the challenges of getting older, this film is unashamedly 2D, with a real weight to it, where difficult topics are addressed with humour and charm.

Diagnosed with Alzheimer's, former bank manager Emilio (Alvaro Guevara) has been placed in a local nursing home by his family. Unhappy about the new arrangement, he is soon taken under the wing of his roommate Miguel (Tacho Gonzalez), who steps in to show him the ropes and introduce him to the other patients. Miquel and Emilio's unlikely friendship helps them face up to some harsh truths about their pasts. and their futures.

Described by one critic as "One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest, set in an older person's care home". this new film has the same anarchic spirit. Ferreras. who worked with Sylvain Chomet on The Illusionist, has a real respect for the realities of being elderly in a contemporary society: that sometimes places very little value on the older generation.

Blue Ruin

Premiered at Cannes, Blue Ruin was one of those really happy discoveries - an American indie film that reveals a new filmmaking talent we can all get excited about. Essentially a revenge-drama, this taught, exciting thriller is so much more than a simple shoot-em-up story. Don't be misguided, there is plenty of gore and violence en route, but this film has a lot more to offer, including twists and turns, moral dilemmas and laugh-out-loud scenarios.

Dwight (Macon Blair) has been living on the streets for years. It is clear from the opening few moments that he has been surviving on his wits, building up the necessary skills to survive with very little. When told by a kind police officer that the man who killed his parents is due to be released from prison, events are set in motion that will have him fighting not only for his own survival but that of his friends and family.

Despite his motives and his actions, Dwight is a deeply moral individual and his desire to do the right thing has us rooting for him from the beginning until the very end. This is in no small way down to the amazing central performance by Blair. Blue Ruin is one of those films vou won't just be talking about for a week, but months or maybe even years later. Do not miss it.

Frank

Inspired by Frank Sidebottom, the 1980's cult personality created by musician and comedian Chris Sievey (identifiable by his very large oversized artificial head), Lenny Abrahamson's *Frank* portrays how ambition, mental illness and failure are as much a part of the music industry as genius, creativity and success. Screenwriters Peter Straughan and Jon Ronson (who was briefly a member of the band with Sidebottom) have fashioned a script here which is funny, melancholy and surprisingly touching.

Jon (Domhnall Glennson) is a budding musician, called up one day as a substitute keyboardist for an experimental pop group called The Soronprfbs. The band is fronted by a man who goes by the name of Frank (Michael Fassbender, yes, that Michael Fassbender), a man who never reveals his face to his bandmates, wearing a giant artificial head instead. As the band work on blending their sound, an invitation arrives to play at the hippest music festival around and success seems just around the corner. Journeying to America for the gig, worrying cracks begin to appear in Frank's persona and the band must ask themselves; how much is success really worth?

Abrahamson (What Richard Did) keeps a firm handle on all the styles on offer here – musical, deadpan humour, dark psychological drama, whilst Fassbender is once again a revelation; for an actor whose career has been so associated with his looks and intensity, to tackle a character who spends the entire film wearing a giant fake head is nothing short of brave. His performance is one that is intensely physical and vulnerable – it shouldn't work, but it does; a bit like Frank Sidebottom himself.

Exhibition

Joanna Hogg's third feature is set to cement her reputation as an acutely intelligent observer of the guiet desperation and isolation in the British upper-middle class. Her pared down style in Exhibition regularly cuts straight to the jugular, like in her debut feature Unrelated (a painful exploration of middle-aged single-hood) or follow-up Archipelago (an uncomfortable fractured family on holiday). Here Hogg tackles a marriage unraveling slowly and subtly like a car crash in slow motion; you just can't tear your eyes away.

The film takes place entirely within the confines of a stunning modernist house in a leafy Victorian enclave of London. Inside live two artists known only as D and H (played beautifully by two non-actors, Viv Albertine, former guitarist from the punk band The Slits and Turner-prize nominated artist Liam Gillick). Married for years, both are artists who work from home in separate rooms, communicating on the whole via intercom. D is reluctant to share her work and there seems to be a growing tension within their relationship. Is it the fact they don't have children? Or that the house has recently been put on the market?

The film is dedicated to the late architect James Melvin. whose remarkable home provides a third character in this two-handed drama. Hogg is not one to show her hand, rarely revealing the details, and the unease which permeates the house is palpable. Much like the surfaces of D and H's amazing home. Exhibition might seem cold and uninviting at first, but it is so beautifully crafted and full of delicious anxiety that it just won't let you go.

An Episode in the Life of an Iron Picker

Epizoda u zivotu beraca zeljeza

Director Danis Tanovic, best known for the Oscar-winning No Man's Land is back in his native Bosnia-Herzegovina with this latest film, highlighting the difficulties of life within a Roma community. Using non-professional actors who recreate one small, but significant episode from their past, Tanovic's film is eye-opening, moving and politically charged.

Nazif and Senada live in a small shack with their two daughters: the surroundings are an industrial and heavily polluted area. Nazif supports his family by finding and selling scrap iron, an occupation that is, at the best of times, unsteady. Getting by on very little and doing without electricity is simply a part of life, but despite the hardship, their home is a happy one and the loving couple tenderly brings up their children. However, when heavily pregnant Senada becomes ill, their lack of health insurance (and a marriage certificate) becomes an obstacle almost too unsurmountable to survive

Using a hand-held camera, Tanovic gently observes the smallest details of their struggle. bringing us into Nazif and Senada's lives in a way that no article or news report could ever do. This is an extraordinary piece of filmmaking (awarded the Silver Bear and Best Actor prize in Berlin) which will open your eves to the injustice that exists around the world and every day.

The Wind Rises Kaze tachinu

Rumoured to be Studio Ghibli master Hayao Miyazaki's last film. The Wind Rises is also one of his most mature and complex. With a story inspired by the life and times of the man who built one of the most beautiful planes in aviation history, the (A6M or "Zero"), this is a film about and for dreamers.

Jiro lives a simple, rural life, but dreams of flying and designing airplanes. In his fantasy world, up on the highest clouds in the sky, he regularly meets Caproni, an Italian engineer who creates the most amazing aeronautical machines. With Caproni's spirited guidance, Jiro studies hard and manages to enter Tokyo's university. His bright intelligence and dedication lead him to become an elite engineer; creator of the state-of-the-art fighter bomber put into service just as Japan was contemplating war with the US. The Wind Rises follows Jiro through the decades and events that shape his life, including the Great Kanto Earthquake of 1923, the Great Depression, the tuberculosis epidemic and of course Japan's entry into war. Along the way, Jiro falls in love and also forms a strong friendship with his best friend and colleague Honjo.

An epic story of love, determination and idealism, Miyazaki's swan song combines many of his trademark themes (ecology, poetry, flight) with a vision of hope for the future generations. The tagline sums this up with simple economy. "Ikineba" - "we have to live."

Godzilla

Having produced a truly independent sci-fi sensation with his first film Monsters, Gareth Edwards has graduated to the big-time in every sense: you can't get much bigger than 40-storeys high and Godzilla. This new take on Toho's monster megastar really is a gloriously staged blockbuster.

Celebrating his 60th birthday this year Godzilla deserves another chance to stomp his mark on the big screen and for British director Edwards, this is not just the opportunity to work on a bigger canyas, it is the fulfilment of a dream project. The cast lends a sense of credibility that could make Godzilla the action film to see this summer; Ken Watanabe, Juliette Binoche, Elizabeth Olsen, Aaron Taylor-Johnson and Bryan Cranston (in his first role since Breaking Bad) provide gripping human drama to balance the humbling presence of Godzilla's tvrannical terror.

Edwards has a flare for visual effects, which he produced himself on *Monsters* and here with the cream of Hollywood's effects masters. Inventive red smoketrails snake into the sky in the wake of Halo skydivers: mysterious atomic creatures are hinted at: San Francisco smolders in ruins, creating spectacular imagery for intrepid cinemagoers. Toho have been careful to make sure Godzilla gets a new film worthy of his iconic status and a ground-shaking party awaits.

A Thousand Times Goodnight

Norwegian writer/director Erik Poppe and cinematographer John Christian Rosenlund's continued collaboration is bearing fruit by attracting the cream of European acting talent.

A Thousand Times Goodnight opens in Afghanistan where Rebecca (Juliette Binoche), a war photographer. is documenting the effects of a female suicide bomber. Pushing to capture the definitive image, she becomes injured in the explosion. While in hospital her beleaguered husband Marcus (Nikolaj Coster-Waldau, Headhunters) arrives to take her back home to their two children in Ireland.

With Rebecca recovering at home, Marcus expresses that waiting for the inevitable phone-call to inform him of her death, has become an unbearable strain to live under, for the whole family. Rebecca must choose between work and family, and she decides to stay at home; rejecting job offers, in order to save her family. When her daughter becomes interested in third world politics, it presents Rebecca with the opportunity to work again. She takes her teenage daughter on a proposed safe assignment to document a refugee camp in Kenya. While there, a local militia group attacks the camp and Rebecca's actions have devastating consequences.

This is a clever, contemporary study of the complexity of the family unit and one that inverts the traditional gender roles. Poppe skilfully retains the pressures associated with maintaining relationships and Binoche delivers a superb performance as the torn central character.

A delicate comedy-drama Ilo Ilo focusses on a dysfunctional Singaporean family in this beautifully realised and heart-warming film, without a hint of sentimentality. A first feature from National Film and Television School graduate Anthony Chan, Ilo Ilo was awarded the Camera d'Or at Cannes and has been picking up prizes at film festivals across the globe, including the London Film Festival.

Taking place during the Asian financial crisis of 1997, the film opens with a young boy, Jiale (Koh Jia Ler) getting in trouble once again at school. His exasperated parents decide they need some help to manage his behaviour. so they hire a live-in-maid to keep an eve on him while they work. Into the frame comes Terry (Angeli Bayani), a 28-year-old Filipino who has left her own infant son back home in the hope of better-paying jobs in Singapore. Jiale is determined to make life difficult for his new minder and it becomes clear very quickly to Terry that the stress of trying to keep the family solvent is having a profound effect on everyone in the household.

llo llo isn't simply an updated version of Mary Poppins. and thankfully the effect that one outsider has on the family is wonderfully understated, but no less profound or moving. Subtle but devastating.

The Two Faces of January

Cinematic adaptations of Patricia Highsmith's novels have a proven track record; from the Alain Delon vehicle Plein Soleil to Anthony Minghella's The Talented Mr. Ripley, her characters and settings translate beautifully onto the big screen.

The Two Faces of January follows a wealthy, handsome American couple, Chester (Viggo Mortenson) and his young wife Colette (Kirsten Dunst), as they holiday in 1960s Greece. Approached by local guide Rydal (Inside Llewyn Davis' Oscar Issac) with an offer to show them the hidden sites of the city, Colette is instantly drawn to this dark stranger. A petty thief, Rydal has every intention of fleecing the holiday makers, but when Chester turns out to be more dangerous than doormat, it is Rydal who is out of his depth and fighting for survival. As with all good thrillers nothing is guite what it seems on the surface, and no-one is ever who they pretend to be.

Taught and tense, this is an elegant neo-noir film that more than delivers on Highsmith's trademark misanthropic, yet playful world. Like all its central characters The Two Faces of January is a delicious blend of manipulation and seduction, which will take you on one vacation that you will never forget.

Before the Winter Chill Avant l'hiver

Filmmaker Philippe Claudel (I've Loved You So Long) reunites with Kristen Scott Thomas for his sophomore effort; a slow-burn psychological drama about relationships, miscommunication and hidden secrets.

Middle-aged Paul (Daniel Auteuil) is a successful surgeon who finds himself on the receiving end of unwanted attention from a former patient called Lou. Flattered, he finds her actions strange and increasingly threatening, whilst still drawn to the mystery of the young woman. His wife Lucie (Thomas) who is initially supportive. soon becomes increasingly suspicious of her husband's behaviour. As Paul's connection to Lou intensifies, the couple's marriage begins to break down.

With nods to Haneke's Hidden this is a masterclass in control; Claudel has the audience in the palm of his hand in this multi-layered film that tackles class consciousness, regret and anxiety in contemporary France. Put simply, this is so much more than your average thriller, and all the better for it.

Jimmy's Hall

Veteran filmmaker Ken Loach returns to our screens for the first time since his inspirational documentary The Spirit of 45. This new film is based on the true story of the deported Irishman Jimmy Galton who took on the establishment when he built a local dance hall. Rumoured to be Loach's final fiction film, this is an inspirational story with all of his usual concerns freedom, community and hope.

Written by his frequent collaborator Paul Laverty (The Angels' Share). Jimmv's Hall is set in 1932 when a wave of anti-communist sentiment swept the Irish nation. Jimmy Galton, returning home after living in America for a decade, decides to revitalise the local dance hall as a space where the community can come together to share ideas, learn and argue; as well as dance. Jimmy's radical idea threatens the church hierarchy and very quickly they take action to stop him, which leads to tragedy.

If this is Loach's swan song, it is a testament to his commitment to the struggle of the ordinary man, ready and willing to face up to oppression and inspire others to do the same.

Spanish born writer and director Amat Escalante's new film is a dark exploration of the effect of drugs and corruption on youth. Set in a lawless, remote and impoverished Mexican community, this is a raw, hard-hitting and gritty drama where bandits rule through extreme violence, whilst administering justice as they

The film opens with the sole of a boot pressed on a young man's battered face and two boys bound, gagged and placed in the back of a pickup truck. Driven down a dirt track until they arrive at an urban space, a public execution takes place. Heli (Armando Espitia) is a 17 year old boy who lives with his wife (Linda Gonzalez), baby, father and 12 year old sister Estela (Andrea Vergara). Estela has a secret boyfriend, a cadet from the local police (played by Juan Eduardo Palacios), who despite the five year age difference, she plans to marry.

The opening, fatal act takes place after the young cadet pinches cocaine from a local cartel, hiding it in Heli's roof-top water tank. Not long after, the mob arrives looking for their wares; killing, torturing and kidnapping everyone in sight, as an example to others foolish enough to tangle with them. When the police become involved - impotent and utterly corrupt - it cements the sheer hopelessness of yet another generation. Growing up fast is definitely the order of the day.

Beyond The Edge 3D

In 1953, Sir Edmund Hilary and Tensing Norgay gained a place in the record books as the first to ascend the summit of Mount Everest. Their path to success was not as assured as might be expected and this film sets out to detail the story of the British expedition and Hilary's iourney to legendary status in his native New Zealand.

Director Leanne Pooley gathers together period footage and photography, along with archival interviews to narrate the epic ascent. These descriptions are dramatized with visual flare throughreconstructions filmed in New Zealand's Southern Alps (the very ground where Hilary honed his aptitude for mountaineering). Blending old and new images, Beyond the Edge immerses the viewer in the story. Cameraman Mark Whetu took his Steadicam to the highest place on Earth to capture unique images, placing you in the position of a third member of the summit team.

The film was greeted with a warm reception in New Zealand where it became the most successful documentary ever at the box office. A fascinating companion piece to last year's BFI restoration release, Epic of Everest, this docudrama features cutting edge cinematography, following Hilary's footsteps along the dizzying path up Everest. Beyond the Edge is your invitation to the top of the world.

Brvan Singer returns to the X-Men franchise that he started back in 2000. This new installment promises to take you back to that level of intrigue and excitement of the first films. The story unites the cast of X-Men and X-Men: First Class in one of the most anticipated tales in the comic series' history.

After the events of X-Men: First Class, the relationship between mutants and humans has become dangerously fragile. Scientist Bolivar Trask seeks to control the X-gene, while an advanced robot army of Sentinels has been built by Trask Industries to protect humanity from mutants. The repercussions of these events see the X-Men of present day in a war-torn and shattered world in which mutants are hunted. The only hope for reprieve is to send Wolverine back in time to unify the factions led by Magneto and Professor X.

Omar

Hany Abu Assad's Omar is both a romance and a thriller, which centres on the life choices of the protagonist. Arrested for his involvement in the random murder of an Israeli soldier, Omar agrees to become an informant in return for his freedom. With many twists and turns along the way, we are lead towards an abrupt and unexpected climax, as Omar struggles with Palestinian identity; the Machievellian machinations of the Israeli secret service; his love; family loyalties and childhood friendships. Whilst not overtly political, this new film is deeply critical of the Israeli government, represented by both the secret service and the presence of the wall. This is a conflict without end that divides loyalties making normal life impossible.

The Unwanted (UK Premiere)

Here, he battles flying eyeballs, deadly severed limbs and his own demonically-possessed hand(!) to once again survive a night from being possessed by grotesque, flesh-eating demons. Brimming with iet-black comedy. Evil Dead II: Dead By Dawn is a rare sequel that equals if not suppresses, the original. Raimi's visual style is more assured this time. while Campbell is easing comfortably into his role as Ash. As Time Out magazine said when the film originally hit cinemas, it is "delirious, demented and diabolically funny".

Before the West fortune can be handed down, the family must endure a night in the cavernous manor, unnerved by the news that an escaped lunatic is at large. Remade several times over fifty years, including the Bob Hope version in 1939, and a 1970s re-make directed by Radley Metzger (Camille 2000), all have their strengths and merits, but this silent film version may by the best.

Katharine Isabelle, star of Canadian horror favourites such as Ginger Snaps and American Mary, leads this gritty home invasion thriller. Newlyweds Cory (Robin Dunne) and Sarah Morgan (Isabelle) take Cory's young son Liam (Peter DaCunha) up to the country for some much needed family time. Despite the idyllic location of an isolated and luxurious country house, tension is rife as Liam resents Sarah for replacing his deceased mother. However, family matters are soon put to one side when it is discovered that they are not alone in the secluded house. Planned as a relaxing getaway. it quickly turns into a fight for survival. The title Torment suggests a 'torture porn' type movie, but instead director Jordan Barker focuses on psychological suspense. The result is a stylish and fast-paced new film that FEARnet calls "creepy, and admirably suspenseful", praising Isabelle as a "firm and feisty heroine".

Army of Darkness

For the third in the Evil Dead series. Sam Raimi plays down the excessive gore and instead increases the outlandish slapstick humour. Back in 1993, many fans were unprepared for this shift in emphasis and the film was met with mixed responses, but over the years Army of Darkness has earned a cult following as strong as its predecessors. Picking up where Evil Dead II: Dead By Dawn left off, Ash (Bruce Campbell) finds himself transported back to 1300 AD, forced to lead a makeshift Dark Ages army against the demonic deadites. The shotaun-totina, chainsaw-wielding time traveller reluctantly battles the undead once again, in the hope of getting back home to the 20th century. With pleasing nods to the novel A Connecticut Yankee in King Arthur's Court and the film Jason and the Argonauts, Army Of Darkness is great late night entertainment; a perfect film to close this year's festival. "Groovy".

David Thewliss' turn as the protagonist Johnny, ranks as one of the great screen performances in all of cinema; Charismatic, witty and fiercely intelligent, the character is also a motor-mouthed, misanthropic monster, Leigh's direction is stunning and in his hands, the capital looks genuinely apocalyptic. Naked is never an easy ride and its depiction of human relationships is at times unflinchingly bleak, but stick with it, there are images, scenes, lines and characters that you simply won't ever forget.
